Artemisia Gentileschi exhibition

Before the latest closures, I was lucky enough to see this beautifully presented exhibition at the National Gallery. In her lifetime (1593-1654), Artemisia was admired as the most celebrated female artist of Italian

Baroque Art. This wonderful exhibition covers forty years of her career from working in Rome, where she was trained by her artist father Orazio, to Florence, Venice, Naples and London, where her father was painting the ceiling canvases for the Queen's House at Greenwich. Inspired by Caravaggio, her large-scale paintings, often featuring heroic female subjects, were recognised for their dramatic power and originality.

If you missed the exhibition, it can still be viewed online in the curator-led tour (£8).
